
- KANGAROOS STAR DANIEL WELLS REFLECTS ON A 'SHATTERING' 66-POINT LOSS TO GEELONG.





How would an American football team look if you had your pick of AFL stars to fill it? mX asked Gridiron Victoria president Dan Levin and Shae McNamara

## **OFFENCE**

#### QUARTERBACK

Levin's law: A leader with good vision and a strong arm. Between 188cm and 198cm.

Shae's switch: Fremantle's Matthew Pavlich. He reads the game well, a great leader, makes and creates plays for his team, just an all-round stud.

#### **RUNNING BACKS**

Levin's law: Tough, take a lot of hits, explosive, evasive but not electrifying pace. He's either going to run someone over or make a cut, a step and get away from tacklers. Stocky build, 176-185cm

Shae's switch: Carlton's Chris Judd and Gold Coast's Gary Ablett. They both find ways to get through the opposition either by brute force, agility or speed. Their vision is second to none and they make plays out of nothing. A huge factor is that they are incredibly hard to tackle due to their amazing core

# IT'S HAPPENING HERE

#### RECEIVERS

Levin's law: Fast, good hands, very quick. Taller, 185–188cm. There are smaller receivers typically the NFL likes them 182cm or taller.

Shae's switch: Richmond's Jack Riewoldt and Hawthorn's Lance Franklin. Both have an amazing way to find the ball in flight. They're pure athletes that can get away from their opposition. They're fearless in the air and their attack on the ball. When they have the ball, just pray they fumble with it because you won't stop them.

#### **TIGHT END**

Levin's law: The all rounder, he has to block and catch. They're pretty big, but they also have to be agile. From 188cm to 192cm or bigger, and about 120kg.

Shae's switch: Geelong's Brad Ottens. I think with his size, strength, speed, agility for his size, hands and his knack to want to bang with the opposition, he'd be a great tight end.

#### **OFFENSIVE LINEMEN**

Levin's law: These guys are big, powerful, with good footwork. Anywhere between 182cm and 209cm, from 130-150 kg. They have to stop the guys in front of them - and protect the QB and block for the running backs.

Shae's switch: Fremantle's Aaron Sandilands. He's just a beast and far too athletic at his size. He would be a headache to get around to the quarter back.

# DEFENCE

#### **DEFENSIVE LINEMEN**

Levin's law: Pretty much the same as the offensive line, it's just they play defence. Typically they're the same build, they're a bit faster, typically more explosive, as defensive players have to react.

Shae's switch: Sydney's Shane Mumford. He would be an absolute pain in the neck for the offensive line with his size, speed and brute power. He would really hurt the quarterback.

### LINEBACKERS

Levin's law: Your smarter defensive players, they've got to be able to react quickly, read the play, very good lateral mobility, very aggressive, guys who like to hit. About 100kg to 110kg, and from 176cm to 188cm.

Shae's switch: Collingwood's Dale I nomas. He's obviously not the right size, but his characteristics match. He has mastered the art of tackling and hunting the opposition. It would be an offensive coordinator's nightmare trying to stop him.

#### CORNERBACK

Levin's law: Smaller, quick, very good jumping ability. Can be a bit shorter - 176cm to 182cm. and able to change direction very quickly

Shae's switch: Collingwood's Harry O'Brien. He's a tremendous athlete and would stick on you like glue.

Levin's law: The simplest position on the football field. Find football, kill football. The safeties are people who run at a million miles an hour and want to run through a brick wall. Typically 182cm and 85-95kg.

Shae's switch: Geelong's Matthew Scarlett. He reads the game better than anyone, and is a real spider as he gets everything in his area. He also lays a huge hit, which would scare the crap out of the opposition

### **PUNTER**

Levin's law: The kicker.

Shae's switch: Collingwood's Tyson Goldsack. He can boom

# Dees did it for Dean

Melbourne defender Colin Garland says the Demons' 96-point drubbing of Adelaide was a result of the players being stung by the criticism of embattled coach Dean Bailey

# **Cold water** on hot Pies

Collingwood coach Mick Malthouse expects to be "ambushed" by an artillery of praise for the Pies by Geelong coach Chris Scott in the lead up to Friday night's blockbuster.

Collingwood and Geelong are unbeaten ahead of their Round 8 clash at the MCG.

Malthouse expected the Cats to talk up the Pies in the pregame banter, but the veteran was handing out his own

"I'm not going to be ambushed one little bit by (Geelong coach) Chris Scott saying 'Collre this, are that', because Geelong have been that for the last five or six years," Malthouse told SEN.

"We're not going to be misdirected, that Collingwood are the be-all and end-all to the football

"I know people are saying 'dominant Collingwood' – I don't think we are dominant."

Malthouse said it was too early to call Friday's game a sneak peek of this year's Grand Final.

'There's always someone who creeps up on you ... some premierships are won from a long way back," he said.

Malthouse confirmed ruckman Darren Jolly would miss the match after knee surgery.
